Slippery Secrets of Spread Spectrum

Everyone remembers when we used to go out to the flying field only to find that someone else was flying on the same frequency.

In fact it seemed like a law of nature that whatever frequency you chose, someone automatically appeared with the same channel.

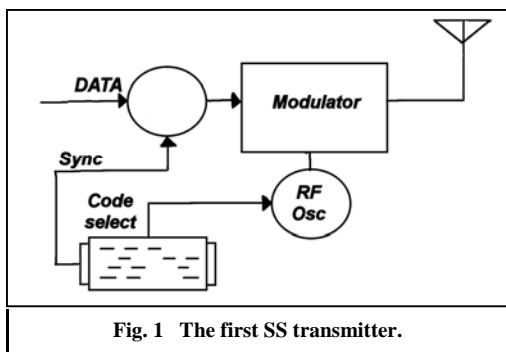


Fig. 1 The first SS transmitter.

It was unthinkable that two people could share the same channel and if a crash occurred, the first words you heard were, "Who the ---- is on my frequency!"

How time, (and Technology) changes.

Now it is common to see a half dozen flyers using the same frequency without interference and with complete reliability.

This is even more evident in the case of indoor flying where a dozen or more pilots all share the same frequency.

Not a pin is in sight.

So what happened? How do these new radio systems work?

Perhaps the easiest way to explain spread spectrum systems is to go back to the original.

Back in the forties, Hedy LaMar, (Yep, the movie star), and musician George Antheils filed a patent for such a system.

Early in the war Japanese navy ships would locate our torpedoes and jam the guidance receivers, knocking them off course.

Using this system the frequency continuously changed. The enemy would be unable to locate the exact frequency, and if they did it would change before they could jam it.

Since Antheils was a musician, the scheme used player piano rolls.

The components were hooked up as shown in Fig. 1. The transmitter was capable of switching to a bunch of different frequencies. The piano roll could be programmed (by changing rolls) to control an oscillator, thereby randomly changing the frequency across the band.

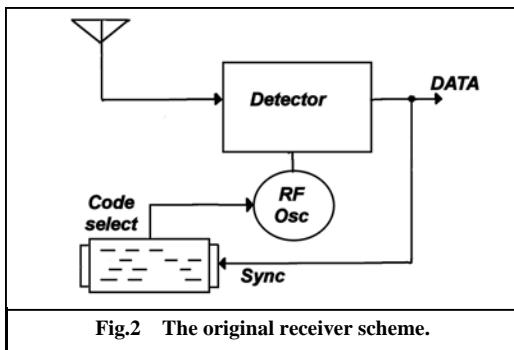


Fig.2 The original receiver scheme.

The receiver, Fig 2, also used an identical piano roll to control its local oscillator. By synchronizing the piano rolls, a secure communication system was obtained.

This is an example of a "Frequency Shift Spread Spectrum" or FSSS.

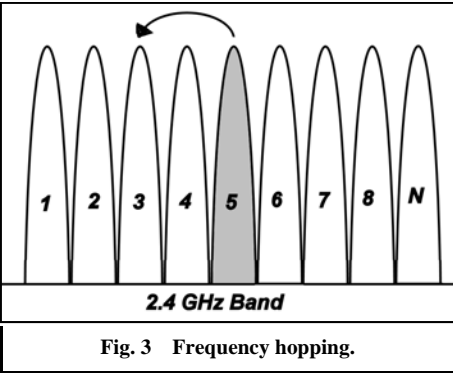


Fig. 3 Frequency hopping.

Because multiple frequencies as shown in Fig. 3, were used in each transmission throughout the band, it was called spread spectrum

For unknown reasons the military did not use this system, but after the war, expanded on the idea and developed secure communications based upon it.

OK, piano rolls are so forties.

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Fast forward half a century.

Modelers have the same problem. Whenever someone turns on the same channel while you are flying, your plane is toast.

Our current systems are “narrow Band”.

The narrow band signals interfere with each other and the data gets confused.

Electronics has advanced to the point where entire circuits are contained in a tiny chip. And the world has gone digital. No need for bulky piano rolls.

An electronic number generator randomly selects the frequency and sends it on to the receiver. The two components set up a handshake and track each other.

The frequency hops rapidly around the band. As often as 500 times a second, while the receiver is locked to it and tracks it.

Meanwhile, all other channels are empty. Another transmitter/receiver combo can use these vacant channels

It can even use the channel that was just in use by the first transmitter, since that channel rapidly becomes vacant.

Frequency hopping is just one of the methods that can be used by Spread spectrum.

A different scheme is used wherein the entire band is transmitted as a single broadband frequency.

Instead of the frequency hopping, the modulation plus a code flips from channel to channel within the band.

The code is combined with the signal and both are used to modulate the transmitted frequency.

When this broadband signal is received, the code is stripped and used to lock on to the correct channel.

Even though many transmitters are in use, the receiver tracks only the specific code that it is bound to.

It ignores any and all other transmitters that are active on the same band. For our situation at the flying field where multiple users are all flying at the same time, this is fantastic improvement over the old way.

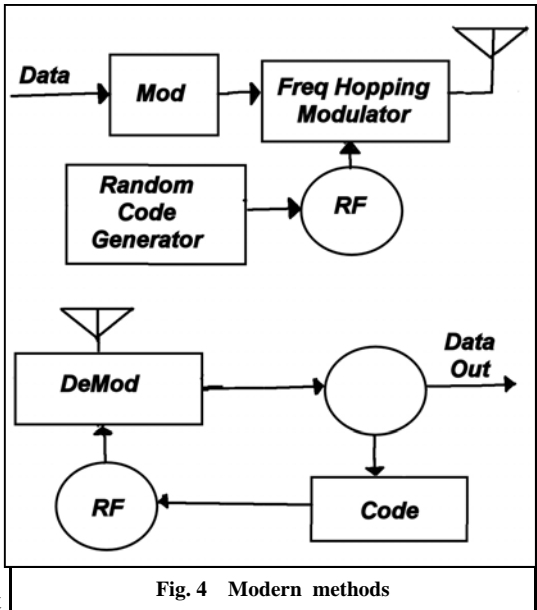


Fig. 4 Modern methods

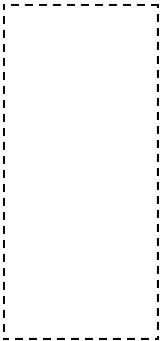
